A new music store has recently emerged here in Wichita Falls, and I had the opportunity to sit down with Jason Byas, the manager of Hayley's Music.

Jason has been in the music scene here for a long time, having played in groups such as Seventy Times Seven in the early 90's, and in bands with members of Bowling For Soup. He was also employed by McCarty Music for several years in the late 90's, and more recently was an English and Journalism teacher at Old High.

When his friend, Dr. John Haley, decided to open a music store, he bought the building next to his eye clinic on Kemp Blvd and asked Jason to run it. Since McCarty's had closed and Music Express owner DeWayne Kinnett passed away last year, and Great Neck Guitars has shut down, he saw an opportunity to offer our town a fresh new place to sell quality instruments, p.a. gear, drums, and provide music lessons.

Jason likes the laid back feel of the store, where people can come in and play and not be accosted by those 'pushy sales people you might find at the large chain stores'. And he is pleased with the caliber of his music teachers Kristin Mask, Donovan Hickman, Kelly Jackson, Mike Ramos, and David Hamilton.

He said he feels like Wichita Falls needed a new place to buy some quality instruments and gear such as Gibson, Fender, Gretsch, Seagull, and Art & Luthier as well as some unique and high-end instruments like Martin, Taylor, and Les Paul.

Haley's Music is also an official Tama and Gretsch drum dealer, and they offer p.a. gear, p.a. rentals, and installation, including brands like QSB, JBL, EV, and Peavey.

Jason invites you to stop by Hayley's Music at 1907 Kemp Blvd and visit with him and Dustin Fike, play around on some great instruments, pick up some strings and sticks, and get all the gear you need to get you and your band set up to play your next gig.

Kim Ward

Kim Ward has had many accolades in her career as an artist, and her work is exquisite, yet she is "basically self taught and has never taken art lessons."

"Like many artists I had a very difficult childhood, so art and reading were my escape methods," she explained, "I was from a real poor family, so all I had was pencil and paper." Once she graduated high school, she also graduated from pencil to paint.

"I enjoy the tactile nature of oil paint," Kim said with a Smile. "I like the luminosity of oil paint and the creamy texture. I like to push the paint around. It is almost like bending it or twisting it. I have to allow the piece to develop itself, and then I start to find tune things."

"It is a process," she mused, "I have an idea in my mind. I might be influenced by a different artist, or technique. I am fascinated by shadows and reflections and texture. I am interested in the process of layering colors. It is almost a game. How did they mix those colors to get that effect?"But she isn't limited to just oil paint.

"I enjoy acrylic paint because it is so fast," she said, "There are so many different mediums that you can work into the paint. Things to make it thick or thin, like sand and polymers. You can thin acrylic paint out so you can use it like watercolor. And by layering you create a lot of depth in a painting. That is how you create reflections, like a stainless steel bowl of water." "Every day I to try and bend it to my will," Kim said, "I am in a Zen state when I am creating art." Some of her influences are Andrew Wythe and Vermeer and Monet, but she is also inspired by local artists. "It is like a little mind game—like tickling the brain to see what is behind their art. Every artist has validation, and there is something about their art that I find fascinating. All of our local artists have something that they can contribute, and that is why not everyone likes vanilla," Kim said. One of her murals is on display at the Wichita Falls Municipal Airport. The mural is about the famous Jenny airplanes, and the pilots who flew them. It is historically

accurate and it all happened in the Call Field Airport almost

"Everyone should join the Kemp Center for the Arts and the Wichita Falls Art Association. We need to reach out and pull in all the artists and be part of a community," she stressed, "We are all up in our heads so much, and we need to talk to each other and bounce ideas off of each other." viewed there and at the Wichita Falls Art Association. She participates in shows all over the region and her art is in many private collections.

FRANK JOE'S COFFEE HOUSE | ESTABLISHED 1889

Frank & Joes Coffee House opened a year ago in Parker Square and has already become the place to get fresh coffee with a laid back atmosphere. A mother and daughter team, Carol Murray and Jessica Edwards, started to put together their business plan 6 years before they opened the coffee hot spot.

"I have a love affair for coffee, and I was tired of standing in line for 18 minutes to get my coffee," Carol said.

There were three factors that they wanted their business to emulate. The first one was to honor the city and the history of the city, hence Frank Kell and Joe Kemp. The cities founders are the namesake of the coffee house. There are even portraits of the gentlemen in the building.

The second thing they wanted to do and be known for is "really fresh coffee".

"I learned that our competition could have their coffee in a warehouse up to a year," Carol said. "I wanted us to have really fresh coffee and that would be an improvement from our competitions coffee. We get our coffee roasted every week, and if you have really tasted fresh coffee, it doesn't compare to other coffees".

They have 2 coffee roasters that cost \$16000 a piece. "We have a large staff of 30 people. When you go to a competitor they push a button. We have a very manual process that is hand created. We don't grind the bean until you order it," Carol said. "We have the quality, and we do have a large staff to keep things moving."

The third thing that they wanted to do is support area non-profits.

"We built that into our business plan," Carol explained, "for every espresso and drip coffee, we donate ten cents to a worthy nonprofit. That adds up to about \$1200 a quarter. We change nonprofits every quarter, and the team decides collectively on what will be the next nonprofit. P.E.T.S. is the nonprofit that we are working with now."

"In terms of a business plan, that is what it is all about," added Carol.

"Another fun thing is that we named some of our coffees after Wichita Falls," Carol said.

They have The Pavilion, with a nod towards Lake Wichita's past. They have one named 8th and Ohio, and they have one named 1889, which is the year that Wichita Falls became officially incorporated.

"We are a lot like Frank and Joe," Carol said with a smile. "Jessica is like Joe Kemp because he was the visionary, and I am like Frank Kell, with him being the numbers guy. I think that is why we make such a great team. She has a lot of creative skills and is an artist."

The shop likes to use local items wherever they can. They get their wine from the Wichita Falls Vineyards and Winery. The pastries are from local bakeries and the odds and ends that they sell are all from local artisans and businesses.

Jessica and Carol have also branched out by acquiring the Primp and Blow Salon located in Parker Square.

"I think both of our concepts are big city concepts. We are proving that big city concepts work in Wichita Falls," Jessica sa id.

Bradley Cooper became sober at 29, telling GQ magazine of his substance abuse, "If I continued it, I was really going to sabotage my whole life." "I don't drink or do drugs anymore," he told People recently. "Being sober helps a great deal ... I remember looking at my life, my apartment, my dogs [when I was still using], and I thought, 'What's happening?"

2. Russell Brand

The comedian, who is outspoken about his recovery from drugs and alcohol, celebrated his tenth anniversary of being sober in December 2012 with this message: "10 years clean today. Thanks for all your messages of love. Anyone can get clean, one day at a time."

3. Matthew Perry

The former "Friends" star hasn't drank since entering rehab in the late '90s for an addiction to Vicodin. He told ABC News, "The thing that I'm most proud of in my life is that if a stranger came up to me and said, 'I can't stop drinking. I can't stop drinking. Can you help me?' I can say, 'Yes, I can help you."

4. Eminem

After battling addiction to drugs and alcohol, Eminem got sober several years ago. "You gotta remember I hadn't recorded a song sober in seven years. So it took me awhile to even feel like I could record a song sober ... I don't know the last time I shot a video sober, without drinking or taking anything. It's been years," he told Vibe.







5. Jennifer Lopez

"I think that ruins your skin. Of course, during celebratory toasts, everybody's like, 'You can't toast with water!' So I'll toast with alcohol and just take a sip," she told InStyle.

6. Keith Urban

Urban has been sober for ten years. "The truth is that I wasn't even aware of where it was at in my life and how it was just going to come down and take me down like it did. I was probably in such a state of denial that I consciously wasn't aware of it."

7. Gerard Butler

Butler quit drinking 19 years ago and recently went to rehab for a prescription painkiller addiction.

8. Tobey McGuire

"I don't think it's a secret that I've been sober since I was 19. It's in half of the articles done about me," he told People.

9. Rob Lowe

Rob Lowe has been sober for just around 25 years, telling Piers Morgan in an interview that he enjoyed rehab. "It was great. I loved it. Because I was ready. Problem is, people go into rehab and they're not ready," Lowe explained. "You want to get sober for your parents, you want to get sober for your job, you want to get sober for the cops, you want to get sober to protect your image. A lot of good reasons, by the way, but unfortunately, the only thing that works is that you have to want to get sober for you. So, I was ready."

10. Kat von D

The tattoo artist celebrated ten years of sobriety this summer, tweeting, "Today, marks my anniversary of sobriety! Yay for not being a drunken a**hole!! :)"

11. Robert Downey Jr.

RDJ has been clean and sober about 14 years. "I think of myself as someone who has no desire, use for or conscious memory of that life," he told Playboy. "And yet I don't shut the door on it, and I don't pretend it didn't happen."

12. Tim McGraw

Tim McGraw gave up drinking for his daughters. "I think it's a personal choice — when it gets to the point where you think it's affecting you adversely and it's affecting your relationships," the country star told Ellen DeGeneres. "It's time to make a change, and I thought it was."

13. Ben Affleck

Ben Affleck says his rehab stint in 2001 helped him change his life for the better. "Simple as this, I quit drinking. It's really not that big a deal. It has no real bearing on anything else in my life," he explained to The Mirror. "Your lifestyle changes at a certain age. Like me, a lot of my friends are married with kids. When you are in your 20s and you're not married

with kids, you're having fun. But when you're in your 30s and you're not married and don't have kids, you begin to develop a Peter Pan complex. As you grow older, you have more responsibilities and you have to step up to them."



14. Andy Hurley (of Fall Out Boy)

When he was 15, Hurley immersed himself in the hard-core punk scene in Milwaukee, and when that wasn't enough, he would travel to Chicago to play or hang out with similar bands. That was when he was inspired to become straightedge — meaning he wouldn't take drugs or drink alcohol — and he is a vegan.

15. Zac Efron

"Baywatch" star sought help for an addiction in 2014. Efron went to rehab in 2014 and admits that, though his alcohol addiction is his "never ending struggle," he's able to cope by attending AA meetings.

I found myself discovering the joy that came with creating something in my image. The way you feel and see the colors reflecting the beauty of a memory, or rather, the ability we have elab-

The moment they had spotted me painting near a shaded tree I was suddenly surrounded with questions and conversation.



As the colors mixed it seemed to have been the highlight of their day. One went on to talk about how his dad "used to" be an artist and how he would watch his dad paint and draw growing up. Earlier in the same random day in Colorado I had hiked up the seven falls to sit on a rock and write in my old worn out journal for a solid hour or so. As I looked down to see the city so far and so small at the bottom, all my worries belittled before my eyes. A moment of appreciation for the valleys in my life. I never asked why that young boy's dad didn't consider himself an artist anymore. Maybe it was that he had drifted from what he loved and it was a matter of a child's perspective. As I continued to paint we continued talking about growing up and dreams. It was about that time for me to get back on the road, to continue on to the next encounter that awaited me. The

painting remained in Colorado with the three precious boys. One was off to share the story with his father; to inspire him to return to the artist he once was. The other two may have found a new interest in painting. The painting they now carried was a reminder, always to stay humble in your success. When you grow up remember the encounters you have and the people you've met. When you encounter valleys in your life appreciate them, for it creates character and growth. Never let anyone tell you that your dream is not possible, and don't let the growth process drift you from your true self.

Endurance House A focal Point for fitness

Mark Pinson and his wife, Valerie, have always had a passion for being involved with pastimes that keep them active. Valerie has been a runner for years and Mark has always been engaged with sports, like BMX and baseball. Valerie and Mark recognized that the city needed a place where everyone could come together, talk, and organize fitness; a hub where like-minded people could get together to discuss running, biking, and swimming and do it as a group. "She wanted a shoe store, and I wanted a bike shop," Mark reveals about the origins of their store, Endurance House.

Valerie's a runner and has been her whole life. She recognized that Wichita Falls didn't have a specialty running store. With Endurance, they are able to put you on a treadmill and monitor your running in order to get you a shoe that best fits you and your feet. Mark has ridden on the BMX tracks for his entire life and their combined passions led them to this.

The store opened its doors October of 2015 and has since been a hub for athleticism in Wichita Falls. The fame of the store quickly rose with their work with the Runners Club. Participants would come into the store weekly for runs and as they shopped for shoes, they were enticed by the store's selection of bicycles. Bicycles led to interest in swimming, and swimming into triathlons.

They began hosting open water swims earlier this summer, and once a month they put buoys out at Lake Arrowhead. This, along with peoples' new passion to run and bike, has started the desire for triathlons. "Since we've opened the store, I'll bet we've added 50 or 60 new triathletes," Mark informed. They also had a spring triathlon at Castaway Cove. The swim began at the Lazy River, followed by a 12 mile bike ride, and then, a 5K run. Their ultimate goal is to get the sport into Lake Wichita. On top of that, they also encourage running with the "Couch to 5K" program, which prepares runners to meet the goal of running 5K without stopping.

The Pinson family continues to stay fit together. Mark and Valerie took up triathlons when the center opened, and they now compete three or four times a year. Plus, this year you can catch the entire family, which includes their twin boys (11 years old), barreling through the 25K at this year's Hotter 'n Hell 100. It'll be a busy day for them because they will also have a booth

Wichita Falls Art Association

Have you heard about the burgeoning art district downtown? Well it all started with the Wichita Falls Art Association Gallery.

The gallery came to being as Jensen Gallery in the Holt Hotel on the corner of 8thStreet and Ohio Street. Brad and Donna Jensen opened it in 2010, but a year later, they had an elderly relative that needed help, so they packed up and left town. However, Brad still had another year on his lease.

Two board members from The Wichita Falls Art Association came up with the idea to run the gallery for the second year of Brad's lease to try the waters and see if they could make it work. It was decided that the gallery would hang only its own member's art, and that there would be a small hanging fee to offset the cost of rent, utilities and other cost incurred with running a business. The individual artists could sell their work from the gallery, and there would be no commission taken from any sale. Also, the gallery was to be manned by members volunteering their time.

It took a few months to get the members onboard, but the board members persisted. Soon the gallery became a success.

In 2012 the gallery opened officially under the name Wichita Falls Art Association Gallery. Before obtaining the gallery, the association had 37 members. With the added bonus of the opportunity to show their work all year, the membership went up to over 100. Soon the members started



paintrenting ing studios downtown, and then one of them opened a multi-artist studio one block away, called the Seventh Street

Studio. And yet another enterprising member opened a studio

next door to the WFAA Gallery named The Lily Pad.

These three entities organized the After Hours Art Walks in 2016. By 2017 the idea had spread. New galleries and businesses wanted to join in. They lined up a trolley for every first Thursday through October to take the visitors to all the stops on the route. Each participating venue would have art on display, or have live music, or sometimes both. The Yard got involved, too. The Yard is on Ohio Street between 7th and 8th Streets, making it centrally located. Even food trucks were brought in to feed the masses! Rain or shine, artists fill the Farmer's Market to show off their art

and sell it to the crowds that frequent the art walks. The After Hours Art Walk will continue through October.

The gallery is right in the thick of things. Hundreds of patrons have visited it during the art walks. This year Art & Soul took place in the heart of this burgeoning new art district. The WFAA Gallery alone had almost 900 people come and view their offerings. The gallery has an eclectic mix of art ranging from traditional to modern, so there is something for evervone. Every month there is fresh art, so it is never boring.

Artists of all skill levels are encouraged to join the art association. There is a \$35 membership fee and, with this, you can show your art with the association in any show they have. This includes The Kemp Center for the Arts, the Home & Garden Show, and usually the Wichita Falls Museum of Art. Because of their location, the gallery takes part in almost all downtown events, which gives the artists and

their art great exposure.

For the last 5 years, the WFAA has also hosted a Photographic Exhibition, and this year it opens on August 1st. Photographers from all over the United States will have their photographs on display. The show is judged, and there are cash prizes. For this show, the photographers do not need to be members of the Association. The exhibit will be at the gallery through August.

The business hours of the WFAA Gallery are 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday. It is located at 600 8th Street and the phone number is 940-343-7507.
