This year marks 50 years of service for The Kitchen/Meals on Wheels and there will be a celebration on Thursday, May 11th at The Forum, 2120 Speedway Avenue in Wichita Falls. The Kitchen serves the Wichita Falls community through Meals on Wheels, the Red Door and Green Door Senior Centers, and Kid's Cafe. Meals on Wheels delivers to more than 850 seniors, home-bound and disabled. High Heels for Hot Meals is their biggest fund raiser of the year and will feature a silent auction and casino tables sponsored by Apache Casinos. DJ Marcus McGee will be providing the music. There will also be signature drinks available and a raffle for a diamond and gold VAHAN bracelet donated by Holder's Jewelers. The \$75 ticket price will provide 150 meals for someone in need. Denton Keltner, Cynthia Doten, and their partners looked years for the perfect location to open a craft beer tap house until coming across 817 Ohio Avenue. It had everything they were looking for including location, ample parking, and enough room to do anything they wanted. They love the location and are excited to be participating in the growth of downtown. Dent: "We couldn't have picked a better location."

Within the space there will be two venues, one live entertainment room that will host music, comedy and special events, while the front area can remain open to patrons that do not wish to view the entertainment. This massive facility boasts approximately 2500 square foot in the main bar and dining area, a 1500 square foot kitchen, MAY 2017 and the live entertainment portion of the venue is a whopping 4000 square feet. If that's not enough room to move, the front patio will be 500 square feet and the covered side patio is 1500 square feet with a fire pit.

With plans to open in early fall, Half Pint will maintain a rotation of 36 craft beers and 4 wines on tap, along with brick oven specialty pizzas and a menu of appetizers. They will focus on providing quality meals with minimal wait time to make it lunch crowd friendly.

Research into the history of this building led to very few photographs, but what did turn up is that it was built in 1912 by Otis T. Bacon, the first mayor of Wichita Falls. The name "Half Pint" comes from an unexpected treasure that was dug up while working on the about four feet below the foundation was a cluster of old bottles. The ones that were still intact were half pint whiskey bottles manufactured by a company that went out of business in 1936. The best guess of how they had gotten there is that the original construction crew tossed them in a hole at the end of a long day of working on the structure. Cynthia said "we scrubbed and cleaned the bottles as good as we could and plan to display them." Half Pint Taphouse sounds like a full serving of fun!





NINTH STREET STUDIOS

By now, most residents of Wichita Falls are aware of the surge of life downtown and the recent growth of the art scene. This growth is not by accident, but is fueled by the passionate individuals that have caught a vision for an active local art scene. Such is the case with Becky Raeke, Linda Deason, and Stephen Taylor at 9th St. Studios. Since opening last October, 9th St. Studios has exploded with activity, hosting events on a regular basis including art shows, live music, and even birthday parties and weddings. When asked for his thoughts on the studios success, manager Stephen Taylor said, "9th Street has become more than what we had initially intended; private studio space for artists. Our place has become a showroom for art, music and events".

In April, photographer Carl Dunn showcased his collection of work portraying rock and roll legends of the 60's and 70's and the place was packed with onlookers. This month 9th St. will be organizing an event with Tulsa artist Daniel Gulick allowing him to paint a mural on the building, followed by an art show on May 27th. 

Attending the night's festivities was a slew of the world's elite. Film makers from France and Germany, some princes, some notable actors and lots of old Hollywood money, all in attendance at this soiree.

They arrived in enough time to get their gear to the stage, wash some of the grease from the fire

off of themselves and still have enough time to watch the red carpet entrance with celebrities. "The plan was for us to be on stage and start playing when they opened the door ... which was very unorthodox, especially for members of a dirty punk rock band from Texas that are covered in grease and have been driving for 2 straight days and haven't slept."

"It was the weirdest show I've ever played in my life. Honestly. It was very bizarre. The stage was huge, very far apart from each other. When we came back in to start playing, there were already people in tuxes, waiting, staring at us with anticipation."

"The first guy I made eye contact with appeared to be about 90 years old, front and center directly in front of me and I thought, 'this guy might not survive this."

They played five songs to kick the night off to a crowd of 600 people. The reactions were everything from "Hey, I'm at a rock show!" to wincing in pain and fingers in ears.

They had a blast, hobnobbed with L.A. peeps, made contacts with filmmakers, stayed at a crappy hotel, went through horrible traffic and drove until they got back to Wichita Falls. All in all, a great trip for our courageous local band. Hopefully this turns out to help them in the long run. "We'd like to have more of our music in movies and films", Sean explained. I'm hoping they at least get a song out of it. - Iames Cook


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1. Cellulite Cream

If you have a wasp problem at home, coffee grounds can help. Place some in a fire-safe jar and light it to create steam/condensation that will help to repel wasps.




8. Garden Safe Keeper

Dog Waltz has been playing in Wichita Falls for going on 5 years, and in 2016, new drummer Sean Biggs brought a flare of unpredictability that has started a new writing phase with no particular genre in mind. While the band reveals an elaborate story that they formed based on a Craigs-list add, posted by an anonymous account, there is another story that Michael Hitt (Guitar/Vocals) and Taylor Slusher (Bass), formerly of The Disco Rico, a popular local act described as retro-pop rock that won the Falls Fest Battle of the Bands in 2011, brought in friend Charles Bridges after the departure of then vocalist Justin Cowheley. Dog Waltz was born, embracing Hitt as their new lead vocalist. With twenty plus years of classical training in guitar and keys, Michael Hitt's professionalism and leadership has molded their sound into a modern indie band with radio playability that doesn't compromise musicality. This new writing phase has the guys incorporating more keyboard into their music so fans of their previous more melodic grooves should get excited. I met with Dog Waltz at a jam pad they share with Leddit Ride, before a practice, to pick their brains a little bit about what makes this dog bite...

Q- Last year the group joined forces with local rap artist, Kroe, to create Bird Dawg, so would you say Hip-Hop has influenced Dog Waltz?

A- When Bird Dawg performs, we're never sure what is going to happen. We bring our style to the performance and hope people dig it. But the rumors are true-we are starting our own Hot Dog label! -*Hitt*

Q- If Dog Waltz was a beer, what kind of beer would it be?

Bourbon - Taylor Slusher

Q- Taylor's height, advantage or disadvantage?

A- Disadvantage, wind- Bridges

A- Well, all he has to do is turn to the side- *Hitt*

A- I think its good thing because I can spot predators or prey from far away.-*Slusher*



A- The dog isn't necessarily an apex predator. *-Hitt*

A- We're not Shark Waltz!.... Can we change our band name? -Slusher Q- Dog Waltz was voted one of the four most popular bands in Wichita Falls in a poll conducted by The Hub. How do you react to this accolade?

A- I demand a recount! *-Bridges* A- We were really surprised. It's super flattering. *-Hitt*

Q- DIY gets mentioned a lot on social media and counter culture. Do you feel like your efforts have helped develop a stronger scene in Wichita?

A- We started throwing shows out of our jam pad on 8th street back in 2013, with friends (Dr.) Philgood, and it would be cool if that inspired other groups to get out and perform. The music scene was here before us, so we maybe innovated by helping start WDE (Waste Deep Entertainment). We all put down our differences and came together to start something. Not everyone stuck around in the end, but that's ok, I think we created a way to bring about and expose new talent. *-Hitt*

TIPS AND TALES FROM OUTBACK with Johnny Divine (Outback Studios 940-613-8436)

Arguably the most famous recording studio in the world would be Abbey Road Studios in St. John's Wood, London, England. Made famous, of course, by The Beatles, who recorded nearly every bit of their musical output behind the doors of this respected institute. The studio, which opened in 1931, was originally called E.M.I. Studios, but in 1970, because of the popular Beatle album, Abbey Road, the name changed. Pink Floyd recorded approximately eight albums there, including Dark Side Of The Moon. Each Beatle returned as solo artists to record there. You'll notice such diversity of artists from Michael Buble to Iron Maiden; 60's greats The Zombies and Gerry and The Pacemakers to modern performers like Kanye West and U2; classical greats Yehudi Menuhin and Arthur Rubenstein to big band legends Ella Fitzgerald and Glenn Miller. For this month's offering of studio trivia, I'm slacking a bit and just giving you a list to read! You can admire it, curse it, or simply reminisce and enjoy it-not the article, but the list! Ron Hamer started drawing at the age of 4 to make his grandmother smile. "I would draw Ant Man and the ant forces," he recalled with a grin, "I would show them to my grandmother, and she would be smiling."

Ron is a very accomplished artist who has won several awards

and whose paintings are in high demand. He is fearless with color when he paints, and is quite a colorful guy, too.

"They would ask in elementary school, 'What do you want to be when you grow up?' and I would say that I wanted to be an artist," he said.

We have his sister to thank for the fact that he started selling his work. "She inspired me to start selling my drawings when I was a teenager," he said. "Kids would need pictures for their assignments, and I would draw them and charge them a dollar a piece."

He studied comic book drawing, and even wrote a book called Win or Bust Card Shark Game Book. He got a copyright on the book, but was told that he needed a patent on it. The cost was "out of reach." He had written and illustrated it, but longed for more artistic endeavors.

He worked a variety of jobs, was in the military for a short time, but eventually ended up in Wichita Falls, where he had spent part of his childhood. But things weren't



going well for him, and he found himself living at the Faith Mission, a homeless shelter.

But his story, like many others in history, turned around when it seemed that he was at his lowest point. Jane Spears Carnes to the rescue. Jane is an artist in Wichita Falls who is well renowned and extremely talented, and she also has a big heart. She was teaching art classes at Faith Mission, and Ron was one of her students. Under her tutelage, he began to hone his artistic skills. At the mission, he painted a very detailed mural of the city of Jerusalem in Christ's day and time, along with accompanying Bible verses and a legend. "She saw the mural and told me that I could sell my paintings," Ron said.

to oil paint, but that is what I wanted to do," Ron explained. "And later I found out that you don't have to be millionaire. I started painting and had my first exhibit 5 or 6 years ago," he said. "That is when I fell in love with oil painting."

"My paintings are what helped me get out of the mission," Ron explained. "I would add what I made with my paintings and a side job, and together, I made enough money to stay out of the mission." Ron then started renting a studio in Big Blue Building downtown, and later moved to a studio with Marsha Wright-Reeves and Janelle Michonski. He then moved to the Seventh Street Studio when it opened.

He likes to paint outer space in a "free loose contemporary style" and enjoys using his imagination to paint fantasy as he sees it; and his vision colors his world.

"I show my art at the Wichita Falls Art Association Gallery, the Seventh Street Gallery, and the Kemp Center," he said.

"This was always something I wanted to be, so I am living the dream," Ron said.

What started out as a way to make Grandma smile, is now a reason for those who view his art to smile.

Thee Wilde Aares

Wichita Falls' newest Irish rock band "Thee Wilde Hares" just formed in February, but they have already booked and performed several gigs. The band debuted to a full house at the soft opening of The Highlander on March 11th, followed by headlining their St Patty's Day grand opening on March 17th. They hydrated their sore heads and went at it again the following night at Stick's Place.

The group features James Ivey on trombone and banjo, John Tucker on bass, Beau Dameron on vocals, Nathan Jun on keyboard, Adam Lynskey on percussion and Brandt Jalowy on guitar.

"We play rock renditions of Irish ballads and other forms of traditional Irish music: jigs, reels and such. We play some covers of other contemporary Celtic rock and punk bands like Dropkick Murphy's and Flogging Molly, as well as originals," said Jun.

Jun uses a midi sequencer to emulate traditional Irish instruments like bagpipes and accordion. Irish fiddlers, pipers and accordion players are hard to come by in Texoma. He has prior experience playing the accordion in Polish polka bands, but last summer he began experimenting with using computerized synthesis which gives him a greater range of sounds to experiment with.

As for the band's name, Jun said: "Wild hares are prolific in Ireland and there's something about the way that the hares frisk about the heather and fight with each other and such. It sort of evokes the spirit of traditional Celtic music. Our spelling of Wilde is, of course, a reference to Oscar Wilde."

Thee Wilde Hares is the third band that roommates Jun and Lynskey have played in together since 2014. Lynskey is an Irish-American and the great-grandson of an Irish singer and fiddle player.

"My grandfather was extremely proud of our Irish heritage, and especially my great-grandfather Victor Lynskey. Victor was an Irish fiddler, and he also sang. We are fortunate that someone had the foresight to record him, and I have spent many nights listening to the songs he sang in his big booming baritone," said Lynskey.

The Polish-American Jun grew up in Cleveland, Ohio, a city with a large Irish-American population. His first girlfriend was a first-generation Irish-American and through spending time with her family, Jun was exposed to a great deal of Irish folk songs, but had to familiarize himself with it musically last summer.

The group has a rapidly increasing repertoire of original songs. "We've tried to write songs that have some relevance personally, but draw on the idioms of traditional Irish music," said Jun. "I'm a music fanatic and I just love the music of all different cultures, but Irish music captures the experience of people, and while I'm not Irish, I identify with their experience because it is similar to that of Eastern Europeans and Jews. It's the music of the oppressed and the rebels."

Jun and Lynskey often incorporate traditional Irish tunes into their new material, melding old and new as seamlessly as possible. Jun's Faraway Gone is a caoineadh, or an Irish lament, as is Lynskey's Amber for Emeralds. From Beverly to Bridgeport is a song about the Irish-American communities on the south side of Chicago, Jun's adoptive hometown. It's sung to the tune of The Wearing of the Green, an old Irish rebel song. For the Shenanigans and One Last Pint are both laddish drinking songs, and Tropic of Cancer is a hard-driving sea shanty that features a newly composed original jig.

"People who have an appreciation for traditional Texas music, or Western Swing and bluegrass, should instinctively appreciate Irish music, because that music by and large grew out of musical traditions that were brought to this country by Irish and Scottish immigrants who settled in Appalachia and the plains," said Jun.
