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



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# KIMHUNTER

Kim Hunter was 8 years old when she received her first knock-off Stratocaster for Christmas as a gift from her father. Her parents owned 9 bars in Oklahoma City and Kim would sneak in and peak through the back door to watch Country and Western bands that were on stage. "I was going to be Buck Owens," Kim joked.

She moved back and forth from Wichita Falls and the Dallas/Fort Worth area starting in 1987 and finally settled here in 2000. Her roots were actually in Punk Rock, with a band called Black Satin that was filled with leather, profanity and insanity. "We got kicked out of more gigs than we played." Kim confessed.

Her Country roots brought her back to the scene. "I always liked the Outlaw Country, ya know, Merle Haggard and Waylon Jennings." Through a karaoke contest, she was able to group up with local musician Toby Wayne to form Renegade, who played throughout the area. The band's sudden split meant Kim need-

ed to fill scheduled dates with a new band. This began her project with the Terry Allen Band, which she played and toured with for seven years. Eventually she took control of the writing in the band Barefoot Dixie, which included Tammy Billen-Scheiber, Jose Romero Jr., Joe Harris, Jimi Divine, and Tim McMillam.

Sometimes touring will take a toll on musicians and trying to keep up with that, and life in general, can get to be too much. They eventually slowed down, yet Kim continued with acoustic performances that ultimately got her to play solo and join the underground coffee shop circuit. Hunter has continued writing for these shows. "I've never done something just for me" Kim reflects, "So I've decided to do a personal project called True Stories." The six song EP will deal with her childhood in east Texas, Honky-tonks and heartaches.

She's done all this, all while fighting Squamous Cell cancer, which was in Stage 4 when they caught it. "It was really hard to get it diagnosed. I'm halfway to saying I'm cancer-free." Right now she is in between a radiation stint to make sure the cancer doesn't return. Her struggle is met with the love of fellow musicians, myself included, who are pulling behind her, her battle and her musical efforts. 





"If you notice, we host all genres of music, and it has brought so many different people together that would not typically come together for the love of the music and the fellowship, and I want to keep extending that." Eric adds, "That's what it boils down to for us, the music and the



fellowship. There's more talent in this town than I think anybody realizes, and we want to bring it out." And this includes the youngest generation of musicians we have seen recently. Future local legends as young as ten years old that have graced the dive bar stage at 311 E. Scott.

As I concluded my interview, Kimberly wanted to point out that they wouldn't have been able to take this next step if it weren't for the help of local music supporter Don Larson, and wants to be sure he gets the credit he deserves.

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# Mike Sherry— From Backyard to Back Door

tion was asked by a seasoned and talented actress, Molly McCloskey, then you know this is what you were meant to do", one teacher, Lynne

to a young, green, and ambitious Mike Sherry while he was still in his teens. At the time, he didn't know the difference, but has since learned that an actor seeks the depth of his craft and is less interested in the glitz and glamour.

When I sat down with Mike in his poster covered office at Backdoor Theatre he enthusiastically jumped into his story. A story that zig zags the country from school to school and stage to stage. A story that begins on a small, homemade stage in a New England back yard. It all started for Mike when his father built a small stage for him to perform a tap dancing show for the family and their neighbors.

He shared his memories of watching Jimmy Cagney movies, like Yankee Doodle Dandy, with his parents and considers those moments to be the beginning of his theatrical training. "My parents would always have me watching musical movies. Ever since then I knew that I was destined for music and theater."

A lot of theater people come from broken homes and are trying to escape. Not Mike. "I came from the leave it to Beaver family". Mike described his

family as typically blue collar and filled with civil servants or trade across the country and eventually bringing him to the Wichita Theworkers. Mike credits his parents for supporting and encouraging his atre. path to the arts, but, as you can imagine, he met some resistance from Throughout Mike's education and work experience, he realized how other family members who would chime in with comments such as small the arts world can be. Another quote that seemed to be the theme that connected everything was "always be truthful and tell the story". Mike believes that every script has a story to tell, even the whimsical comedies. "Without a story to tell, then what are we doing?", Mike asks. "The story draws the audience in and engages their hearts and minds". He applies this concept to every project that he works on. "To this day, that's how I direct my own personal work as well as when I direct other people on stage."

Some of the notable schools Mike attended include the American Musical and Dramatic Academy in New York City, where he met his wife Erin. Erin was a dancer and that kick-started Mike's interest in honing his dance skills. Desiring to continue perfecting his dance abilities, he decided to attend Elon University in Phoenix Arizona, which he describes as "the best school" that he attended. Elon had a great program that assisted in finding jobs for its students and that's just what happened for Mike. The dance training that he received at Elon, topped with a network of artists, landed him several jobs from

networking opportunities that opens doors for new experiences. Eventually Mike decided to move back to Wichita Falls, and not long after that, received a late-night call from Dwayne Jackson at the Wichita Theatre asking him to come down immediately for an audition to dance in CATS. "It's Sunday night about 10 or 11pm, but I grabbed my dance bag and went". Mike got the role and, due to some unforeseen issues with project leadership, he was able to step up into some other roles including choreography. This helped him to immerse himself in the local art scene and eventually landed him the director position that he now holds at Backdoor Theatre.

Mike does not take credit for the success that he has experienced. He is quick to shine the spotlight on everyone from his parents, wife, schools, teachers, peers, friends, and other local organizations. He pointed Wichita Falls Art Alliance, Wichita Theatre, and several individuals that all help foster a healthy and thriving arts and theatrical community here in Wichita Falls. Mike could not say enough about the Backdoor staff and volunteers, and their role in the success of the sets and shows.

He concluded by telling me "It's not just about entertainment. We can be entertained by watching Netflix. It's about going deeper and finding meaning in life through the arts." Mike is not afraid to tell the story.

Mike and Erin are co-directing Dirty Laundry, which is currently playing at the theater. Coming up is the Rocky Horror Picture Show in which Erin will be taking the lead choreographing and Mike will be acting in the role of Rocky.

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# River Bend Nature Center RRIVE

River Bend Nature Center (RBNC) is a twenty acre non-profit environmental education facility that has entertained and informed visitors for over 20 years. Approximately 35,000 people walk through the center each year, of which over half are kids. The center houses several species of critters that are native to this area and walking through the center one learns how each plant, animal, and other things that thousand people over the edge crawl or slither, rely on each other and pride themselves in safety for survival. The staff care for each resident critter with great care and compassion. Everything there from turtles to tarantulas have a name, and many even have a nickname in addition to that. One of the most popular attractions is the butterfly down if you prefer. conservatory.

Being a non-profit facility, RBNC relies heavily on donations and



fund raising opportunities to help pay the bills. This summer one of the most fun ways to raise money presented itself. A company called Over The Edge that has helped raise over 60 million dollars for non-profits actually contacted RBNC to see if they would be interested in teaming up and, of course, they accepted.

Over the edge has sent over 30 and professionalism. Each participant will be geared up, guided, and lowered by a professional. No experience necessary. You can participate in the lowering or just hang out and let them lower you

So, how does one get the chance to rappel down Big Blue? First, go to www.riverbendnaturecenter.org

and find the events page, register by paying a \$25 tax deductible fee, and follow the instructions. You will receive your own page where people can donate toward your goal and advice on how to reach your goal. Once you raise \$1000 you get to go Over The Edge. You can even do it as a team or business to help reach the goal quicker and easier. If you are an over achiever and hit \$1500 you receive the GoPro video footage of your descent. Every dollar raised goes to RBNC and is tax

deductible for the donor. River Bend Nature Center is currently about 70% of the way to their \$100k goal for this event.

The big event will take place on Saturday, September 23rd from 9am to 5 pm at Big Blue on the corner of Scott and 8th St. downtown. Participants will be sent over the edge approximately every 15 minutes. There will be vendors and activities for people that prefer to stay

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### MILESTONES AND NEW BEGINNINGS for the Wichita Falls Symphony Orchestra



The Wichita Falls Symphony Orchestra (WFSO) celebrates two milestones this season—providing 70 years of live orchestral music and educational programing in Texoma, and the hiring of Fouad Fakhouri, the WFSO's first new Music Director-Conductor in twenty years. Following Candler Schaffer as the orchestra's 8th conductor, Maestro Fakhouri will kick off the season on October 1st with music of Mozart, Marquez, and

Fakhouri, who was chosen out of one hundred and forty-four highly qualified applicants from around the world, lives in New York with his wife Diane and daughter Bella. A composer himself, he has degrees from West Texas A&M and UNT, as well as from Pennsylvania State University. Having recently retired from leading the Fayetteville Symphony Orchestra in North Carolina for twelve years, he now heads up not only the WFSO but also the Saginaw Bay Symphony Orchestra in Michigan. To date, he has guest-conducted nine other orchestras, including the Lebanese Philharmonic, the Rochester Philharmonic, and the Cairo and Bulgarian sym-

Though the Wichita Falls community attempted to establish an orchestra in 1915, it was not until 1948 that the WFSO was established in earnest. Over the last 70 years the WFSO has performed with countless internationally renowned soloists, including Benny Goodman, Van Cliburn, Duke Ellington, Mark O'Connor, Chet Atkins, Nadja Salerno-Sonnenberg, and American composers Alan Hovhaness and Michael Torke.

This season continues that tradition and promises to have something for everyone. Texomans will have the unique privilege of hearing actor and former Marine, Wilford Brimley,

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narrate Chris Brubeck's Quiet Heroes: A Symphonic Salute to the Flagraisers at Iwo Jima as part of the WFSO's Veterans Day salute to our men and women in the armed forces. The world-famous Canadian Brass will join the orchestra for the second time at their annual Christmas concert in December, and in February the orchestra will be joined for the first time by concert pianist (and Dean of the Lamar D. Fain College of Fine Arts a MSU), Dr. Martin Camacho. Closing out the season in April will be an ex citing multi-media program called Pixar in Concert, which will bring to gether live music and big screen video clips from all fourteen Pixar films including Cars, The Incredibles, and the Toy Story trilogy.

To help commemorate their 70th anniversary, the WFSO is in the mids of a fun interactive community campaign called "Archiving the Past, Ar ticulating the Future." Music fans of all ages are invited to share their mos memorable WFSO moments by recording one or more brief videos or their cellphones and emailing them to Alicia Deges, whose contact information is below. Videos will be compiled in an online video archive or the Symphony's webpage and shared throughout the season on Facebook All stories are welcome—from attending your first concert as a child to singing your favorite 60s hits with the Midtown Men last season; whatever your favorite memories, the WFSO invites you to share them via video.

reminisced. "I wonder what happened to those old books. I would love to have them now. I drew horses. I never had a horse. I have always had a love affair with horses," he added. "I still paint them sometimes."

Gary had a passion for art even at such an early age, and the passion has grown over the years. He began to excel in art in the first grade. "I got the most attention with my art in school. Mrs. Williams, my first grade teacher, developed a liking for my art and showed it to Glen Conway who taught art in junior high," Gary said. "He came and saw me and bragged on my art. He kept up with me through college, and

High (Wichita Falls HighSchool) to teach in the 80's," Gary said. "We both taught. Glen was a great artist", Gary exclaimed. "Later in life he even collected some of my paintings".

Gary taught art for 40 years, with the first 2 or 3 years in elementary school. His higher education began with an art degree from Midwestern State University in the fall of 71 and then graduated in 81 with his Master's Degree in Counseling. "I always had an interest in that. I was always fascinated by the visual arts and the human being. They are both so unpredictable," he explained. "The intellectual part of the mind and the creativity of it. When I wrote my dissertation, I wrote about the artists versus the scientists. Art is impossible to grade and put a number on."

The philosophical side of art is still influencing him, and much of it had to do with a professor named Larry Fleming. Larry was a character with

show his art at the Wichita Falls Art Association Gallery.



Note: Participants must raise the minimum \$1,000 to participate in this thrilling opportunity.







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
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
