# TIPS AND TALES FROM OUTBACK

with Johnny Divine (Outback Studios 940-613-8436)

As I write this, it has been six months since I lost my middle son, James, to a tragic choking accident. It has been the longest and hardest six months of my life. Needless to say, he was precious to me, as are my other two sons. Beyond that, he was my writing partner, my fellow musician, my fellow recording studio technician, often my musical mentor, my neighbor, my personal comedian, and my dear friend. In case any of you out there have had to deal with, or are dealing with, major loss, and you are not aware of the Five Stages Of Grief, I thought I would just discuss them in hopes they may help you as they have

The first time I was made aware of these stages was about 37 years ago when I lost my best friend from high school. The grief stages were shared to me by another friend and I was amazed at how I realized I was going through the stages without ever hearing of them in a categorized way. One feels all alone at times like this, but it should be known, you are not alone. Even with the outpouring of more than one thousand condolences by mail, phone calls, and Facebook, I still felt all alone at times. My thanks and love to all of you for reminding me that I was not in this by myself.

Categorizing these stages of grief by no means makes it a simple process to grieve, as we all grieve differently. It also doesn't pretend to finally get you through the process and make everything right again. Grief caused by tragic loss does not just up and go away. This list also does not offer an exact order of which stage you will go through or when you will go through it.

I would like to show the list and make some comments on each stage. Hopefully you will identify similar feelings and walk away knowing you are not alone, and that you are truly welcome to lean on me. It helps hold us both up.

Denial: Often expected to be the first stage of grief, I can surely agree with a feeling of denial. My first thoughts were, "This can't be true. Maybe there has been some sort of mistake. How can this be happening", etc. These sorts of feelings sweep over you like a wave that you can't escape. You definitely feel like you're drowning. As the days have passed, I feel like the wave finally let up, but I know without a doubt that another is headed my way.

Anger: It's so hard to believe that I could actually blame my son for this unfortunate incident. Many are angry with their god, other family members, friends, and often, just anything that stands before them. But there are moments of doing just that. "Why didn't you come down to the farm with me that night? Why did you choose to do what you did that evening? "Why? Why?"

Obviously, James had no wish for things to turn out like they did. Anger in this context is somewhat interchangeable with Blame. It seems to be human nature to lay blame anywhere one thinks it will help take a burden off of oneself.

Bargaining: Once in the grip of such heartbreak, most will look to the universe, to their god, to anything that they think could reverse what has happened and one will want to bargain away even their own lives to change the outcome. "Oh, my goodness! What I would give to have my boy back!" "Why didn't you take me instead?" "Surely there is something you would rather have than my boy!" Harsh and not very practical, but it's as natural of a response as any.


Depression. Not to be confused with clinical depression, which may be chronic. Depression caused by loss is considered episodic, even though the episode my last for months, years, or even a lifetime. We often think we are depressed when we first lose someone, but at first, we are so overcome by shock and other emotions, it takes a while before depression actually sets in. I must say though, that this is the one stage that tears me up. It's a rare day that I don't break down and weep. It's a rare day that I don't have tears blurring my vision. It's a rare day that a feeling of hopelessness doesn't come across me. And there is not a single day where I am not surrounded by memories of my son which bring which bring on an overwhelming sadness. Thankfully, happy memories show up often, too. You spend a lot of time trying to chase the sad ones away, but it is important to totally embrace the happy ones. For example, my son was an organ donor, and we received word that his unselfish decision to try to help others has so far resulted in two people having their vision restored.

Thank you, James. Your love continues.

Acceptance. This is not saying you are healed or have recovered from loss. It's a point where you are not constantly feeling the vast array of emotions of grief, but a point where you are able to look to the horizon and see a better day. I must say, I have not reached that point by any means. I also know though, that I must try to be strong. I have two other sons. I have my grand-children. I still have my mother. I have my friends. I have Ann. This translates to, "I still have a life, and I must do my best to live it and not give up".

There you have the Five Stages Of Grief through the eyes of someone who is smack dab in the middle of them. Hopefully a personal look at them will help someone out there who is also part of this process. If you feel immune to this pain and sorrow at this time, I don't want to sound like Mr. Doom And Gloom, but it is quite likely your time will come. Be strong and don't be afraid to lean on those around you. Some will not, but most will understand.

She is strong, hardworking and continues to stay motivated through the ups and downs of the artistry world. She's in a band called "Trauma Queens," she is in charge of her own Art Collective and a self-taught artist. She is the founder of the Angry Girls Art Collective, creating it with the intention of bringing talented, underrepresented, like-minded women and LG-BTQIA+ people together to provide a safe space for them to express themselves.

Cha Sue was born and raised in Wichita Falls. She studied AP studio art in her high school years. Her art explores gender identity, politics, and alternative femininity. Using acrylic, watercolor, and ink she creates queer pieces that are intended to make the viewer question their assumptions about the subject matter. Her use of color, shape, and symbols permeates multitudes of emotion. Her work promotes inclusivity amongst all genders, races, and backgrounds.

"I do a lot of different kinds of art, including textile work (crochet, embroi-



dery, machinework), watercolor, acrylic, and ink (and sometimes a combination of all three)."

I had the pleasure to interview this incredible specimen, and she did not disappoint. She is inspiring and motivated to continue growing her art collective.

"Everyone I meet inspires me. The world is such an odd and small place and each and every one we meet has a story. The chaos of it all and how little we are as a species inspires me. This is why I love depicting the human form. I am almost obsessed with people and how beautiful we all are, how our struggles can shape our lives for the better or worse."

This beautiful lady love for art has made something bigger... an Art Collective. She is surprised how much attention it has received, but it only becomes better. The Angry Girl's Art Collective (AGAC) was established in early 2017. It is created to bring girls, women and LGBTQIA+ artists that are local and help them feel less alone.

She states, "Politics, gender, socio-economic status, sex, it all ties in with my work. Also, life

experiences that are so human yet often go un-discussed, such as medical and mental health problems inspire me greatly.".

There is a total of 224 active members and counting. This is all promoting by mouth and social media. Currently, AGAC is looking for a headquarters but holds meetings weekly at a local coffee shop.








# ADJUSTING PICKUPS TO ACHIEVE A DIFFERENT TONE OR SOUND

Electric guitar pickups are the heart and soul of an electric guitar. Add some witches, and you are able to select a single pickup or multiple pickups. Roll back the volume or the tone, and you are able to customize your sound as you're playing. But for a more permanent change in tone, sustain, or sound, we can make adjustments to the pickups themselves.



Pickup adjustments can start with adjusting the pickup height, that is, the distance between the top of the pickup and the bottom of the string. There is, for each pickup, and optimum height, or distance/clearance, at which the string is able to vibrate freely and the magnets in the pickup don't affect the string such that there are overtones or a lack of sustain. Generally, lowering the pickup gives it a darker, maybe even a woodier sound, while raising the pickup gives it a brighter, sometimes harsher sound or tone.


With pickups built with polepiece screws, such as the Humbucker pickup, or the P90 pickups, raising or lowering the polepiece screws, either all of them, or selectively can help to achieve either

a balance in string-to-string volume, or an overall tone in one or more pickups.




With single-coil pickups, as in a Stratocaster or a Telecaster, the pole pieces are fixed magnetic bars. In the case of most import guitars with single-coil pickups, there is a bar magnet on the bottom of the pickup. On American-made models, the pickups



usually have the Alnico magnetic pole pieces. The latter design can actually be pushed up or down to achieve a balance in string volume. These magnets are typically stronger than the magnets in Humbucker pickups. So, what works for a single coil probably won't work for a Humbucker.

At any rate, adjustments like these are not invasive and are easily reversed.



Raising a pickup will usually result in higher output or volume as well. The neck pickup is usually lower than the bridge pickup, mainly because the strings need more room to vibrate at the neck position than they do at the bridge position. Along with that, since the strings don't vibrate as much as the do at the neck position, so the pickups need to be closer to the strings at the neck position to have the same or slightly higher volume. It's long been thought solos or "leads" needed to be played on the bridge pickup for the solo to cut through the rest of the band. Now, however, we see many solos where the guitarist may use the neck pickup, or both pickups during a solo. As a result, achieving the desired balance in volume between pickups is essential.

# BRANNON OLIVER: GOING WITH THE FLOW

Brannon Oliver is a multitalented musician and songwriter originally from Clovis, New Mexico. He started playing drums at age nine, and guitar at age 15. After moving to Wichita Falls in October of 2017, Brannon made his way into the local music scene shortly thereafter. He has since established himself locally as a solo act and as a drummer for the band Raymundo, as well as touring with the band Mitch Gray and the Conspiracy from time to time. I sat down with Brannon to ask him a few questions about his own music.

"All of my lyrics came from past events in either my life, someone else's life, or something that I've shared with somebody. Almost every song I have has a meaning to it that I know, but nobody else might really know. It's more how they want to perceive it. That's my favorite part about song writing."

Brannon expressed when asked about his technique, "I'll sit there and find a riff, or I'll find something that just clicks in my head and I'll go with it. I'll work with it for a little bit, I get it in my head and I'll hear it in my head on a non-stop loop, and then that's where my lyrics will come from. Throughout my day, singing in the car, driving around, or just outside smoking a cigarette, you'll see or hear something or somebody says and you're like 'that'd be so rad', and so you write it down." Continuing, "I'm almost meticulous

about it [practicing]," Brannon admitted. "Free time is hard to come by these days. It is hard. It's one of those things where I'll have a riff that's been going in my head and I'll have a song, but I'm lucky enough to have my guitar and my amp at work that I can just jump on there. If I'm really working on a song, I'll get really manic about it and I'll sit there with coffee and I'll be in one spot for hours just writing and writing and going about it."

Brannon's dark yet easy-going and kind persona makes for passionate and intense music that appears to come quite naturally to him. In his solo act, his earthy voice and intricate guitar tone create a solemn musical landscape that leaves the listener to reflect on their own life experiences. His music could best be described as stripped-down, raw and melancholy.

You can find Brannon's EP, which was released in November of 2016, titled "For All The Right Reasons, At All The Wrong Times" at boliver.bandcamp.com. It is free to stream, and features both studio and live recordings. Brannon has been working on a brand new album that has a tentative release date for April 30th, so keep your eyes and ears open for updates. You can also find him at the Gypsy Kit every Tuesday night for their open mic night from 6-9pm.







# GHANBAR

Wichita Falls has no shortage of incredibly talented musicians in every genre from metal to punk and country to hip hop. Most of these musicians you can catch on any given weekend playing one of the great venues around town, but there are a few hidden gems that choose to play simply for the enjoyment of the craft. They may make an occasional appearance, but for the most part they stay out of the spotlight and play their instruments for the sole purpose of personal fulfillment. Among these isolated pickers we find Nick Ghanbari.

I first met Nick three years ago at the grand opening of 9th Street Studios, where he was tuning a piano to be used at the event. Tuning pianos is a pretty specific skill itself. "I help Becky the owner of 9th Street Studios, from time to time. We have been friends since high school," Nick shared. "She lets me play an acoustic show there occasionally." In fact, Nick will be performing there during the August Art Walk.

Music started for Nick at an early age. When he was about 4 years old his mother was trying to learn piano. "I would go out there when she was done practicing and start playing around on the keys and she noticed that I had a predisposition to it, so I started taking piano lessons until I was about twelve," he reminisced. Then his lessons and musical advancement ceased until college, when he decided to pick up guitar and reignite his passion for learning music.

Following college, where Nick secured a degree in Music Education, he did the touring musician thing with local greats, Cody Shaw & And The Rhythm Boys and Johnny Cooper. He helped shape their sound by backing them with multiple instrumentation including piano, lap steel, and Rhodes. He spent his spare time building up a clientele for piano and guitar lessons which blossomed into what is now Flat 41 Music, a brick and mortar business located at 1923 9th St.

With a baby boy on the way (due in September), Nick confesses that he is well over the touring life and is quite content learning new techniques and teaching others how to play music. Ghanbari says that he will continue to do the occasional solo gig, but has no interest in performing with a band. As mentioned, he will be performing at 9th Street Studios during the August 1st After Hours Art Walk on an extremely unique instrument called the Chapman Stick.

The Chapman Stick is not an easy instrument to play. Developed in 1969 by jazz guitarist, Emmett Chapman, the Stick has 8 different models which are 8, 10, and 12 string electric instruments that are set up to play bass lines and melody and played using a two-hand tapping

technique. It could be considered a mash up of keys, guitar, and a percussive instrument. Typically, one hand plays the melody on the treble strings and the other plays rhythm on the bass strings. It has been used by support musicians for bands Pink Floyd and Yes, and many others.

Nick received a Chapman Stick from his mother as a college graduation gift in 2006. It sat for years before he decided to pick it up and started learning to play it. He is now prepared to present it in a public performance on August 1st at 9th Street Studios, where he will be playing famous and familiar songs that will provide the listener with a visual and audible experience that they will not find anywhere else in town.

If you are looking to learn how to play an instrument or seeking an instructor for your children, pay Flat 41 a visit. If you are looking to be humbled as a musician or seeking some lively and interesting entertainment, attend the August Art Walk and swing by 9th Street Studios for Nick's live performance on the Chapman Stick.

# DOWNTOWN MUSEUM IS A HIDDEN GEM

I've always been curious about the Museum of North Texas History and I decided to go explore. My trip took a total of two days, but I have never felt so inspired and educated.

The first day I stepped into this "hidden" off the streets building, I met with the executive director, the curator and a staff member. They were the most helpful bunch I have ever encountered in a museum before. I had the pleasure to explore the museum, interview the curator and interview the executive director. Having an interview with the curator and the executive director, opened my eyes more to what the museum holds.

The curator, Leanne Ray, specializes in researching specific collections and pieces. She curated Boots on North Texas. This exhibit is all about cowboy boots made by North Texas companies. She went all out on research and discovered that most boots were based out of the town, Nocona. That company was owned by a woman named Enid Justin. She decided to start her own boot company in the 1920s, which was really revolutionary.

While I was browsing The Nat Fleming Western Hat Collection, Ray shared a recording to explain more about them. She also told me funny



stories that associate with the hats. It was nice to know that not only are these hats historical but they hold sentimental value too.

This was one of my favorite exhibits. It was neat to see the rows of cowboy hats. The exhibit does not carry straw hats due to the light potentially deteriorating it, but there are still plenty to see. There is a total of 288 hats that are on display. There is also a boardwalk display showing what a shopping front would look like. One of my favorite artifacts was in this room from the 1986 bank robbery, it was a hoof made into a jewelry box. Ray was kind enough to share an interesting fun fact about how it came from the hoof of a horse that was shot during the robbery. It was Mr. Wagoner's favorite horse and the foreman took a hoof off and made it into a jewelry box. Right beside it was a bank bag from that time period. It was all fascinating to see.

I had the pleasure to interview the executive director, Madeline Calcote. Having only just met this woman, I can see that she is incredibly passionate about her museum and the Wichita



Falls Community. She shares thoughts on her favorite exhibits and what items mean the most to her. Calcote only wants to spread the educational value and importance of each individual exhibit. It is clear that she loves her job, and continue to learn about museums.

"Museums to me are important places. They give communities and visitors a place to learn about where they are living and where they are from...To experience from a different viewpoint, to learn about things that you don't see often anymore. For us being a history museum, we get to educate the community about how technology

has changed the places we live. The differences industries have affected the places where we live," states Calcote.

This is a true statement of a dedicated executive director, and how much her passion stems from history. The two of us ventured into more questions and discovered her favorite item in all of the collections which is the "Iron lung." This device helped people breathe at a lower pressure and their lungs could work a little easier. This occurred all over the world with the Polio epidemic.

Calcote adds," This is a great way to talk about how technology has changed the medical field, and how it helps people realize how things have changed so much."

Also, the whole museum collaborates and holds an event called "The Mysteries of the Museum" It is a game where they highlight weird stuff and put them in cases. There are no labels and the guests come in and make their own stories or recognize them. It is a fun experience and fun to watch the visitors enjoy it.

Another collaboration process is between Calcote and Ray to see what exhibits will be next. They use objects to tell stories. The mission is to use objects from the community to tell stories of each collection. Researching exhibit can be a long process and there is full confidence on these two doing it properly and well.

The core exhibits are Heritage Hall with what a boardwalk would have looked like, there is Nat's Hats which is a collection of cowboy hats by Nat Fleming, military collection, oil and gas, medical items, vintage collection of toys and dolls, and a Native American exhibit that is hoping to expand.

Also, the museum staff are big contributors to the art walk. This year a local blacksmith sold items which were a cool mixture of history and art. River Bend Nature Center was a part of it as well. They let people from the art walk do a guided tour, and this brings more business in. Also, the museum is open to help support local artists set up in front of the museum. The museum wants to support those that support them.

To end this interview, I asked two final questions. I asked for a special thanks. Calcote gives special thanks to museum staff, museum board members volunteers. and Wichita Falls community. She quotes" We wouldn't be around without their dedication."

I asked a challenging question. Do museums exist to interpret the past or to change the present? She responds with "Yes, because by interpreting the past...we are working towards changing the future by creating a space for people to see...and it is inspiring in some way or we hope WWW.THEHUBNTX.COM




to be inspired in some way."



# Wee-Chi-Tah Wine Trail

The three wineries in the area are working together, rather than being competitive to help make Wichita Falls a destination for wine lovers. The Hook & Ladder Coffee and Wine Company, the 6th Street Winery and Horseshoe Bend Cellars Vineyard and Winery have banded together with the Conventions and Visitors Bureau to create the Wee-Chi-Tah Wine Trail and Passport.

"It was a collaborative effort between the Conventions and Visitors Bureau and the three wineries in town. They had come to us, and they wanted to do something together. We wanted people in and out of Wichita Falls to be aware that we have three wineries in town," said Cristin Dias of the Conventions and Visitors Bureau, "We were excited that they wanted to work together."


"One of the things people have a

misconception about is that all businesses are competitors, but we want to support each other. We want it to be a friendly thing for people to freely move between businesses and not feel like they have to be secretive. We want to support each other. We are all friends, and we are happy to promote as a unit; because if we all do well the entire area does well," said Bill Andersen, owner and operator of the 6th Street Winery,


An incentive to travel down the Wine Trail is a desirable prize any wine connoisseur would love. One lucky patron will receive a gift basket from each of the wineries by getting, using and turning in a passport. "The Wine Trail itself already exist and the passports are out," Bill Andersen said, "The passport basically has three spots for each winery and is similar to a passport you get when you are traveling. When you get into the winery, we actually

put our unique stamps on our three spaces. It takes three visits per winery for the passport to be complete. It can then be taken to any of the wineries, and we will make sure it gets to the CVB." It can also be dropped off at the CVB office or mailed to the office. They are located at 1002 5th Street. "We did a lot of research on other wine trails in the country," Cristin said, "With this wine trail you could realistically hit them all in one day if you wanted to."

The passports can be picked up at their office or any of the wineries. "We designed the passports in house at the Conventions and Visitors Bureau, and obviously, we worked very closely with the 3 businesses. We created different stamps for each winery. We are going to do this every year, so this year we gave people a little more time to turn it in. They have to drop off the completed passport by January 31st,

and we will draw a winner on February 28th," Cristin explained.

6th Street Winery is in the Depot Square in the historic district of downtown. Most of the original structure has been preserved with exposed large wooden trusses in the tasting room area. They are an urban winery that partners with vineyards in Texas and other parts of the country to secure premium grapes that make up their 20 plus wines according to the CVB website. Their premier opening took place at the April After Hours Art Walk, and they are open Friday evenings from 5-9, Saturdays from 2-10, and Sundays from 1-5. They are also open for the monthly After Hours Art Walks.

Hook & Ladder Coffee and Wine Company are also located in the historic Depot Square at 616 7th Street. They are located in an original 1884 building that is a National Landmark. They are the first urban winery in Wichita Falls. "We have approximately 20 different kinds of wine. There is a bottle of wine somewhere on that wall for anybody even if they aren't a wine connoisseur or wine drinker, they will find something that will appeal to them," co-owner, Bill Weske, guaranteed. They also roast coffee which they sell in their store too and don't forget the flatbreads with the original recipes such as taco explosion The Hook & Ladder also host events and the winery can be rented out for parties. Their operating hours are Wednesday from 5:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m., Thursday and Friday they are open from 11:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. and Saturday they are open 10:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.

The Horseshoe Bend Cellar Vineyard and Winery is located at 3399 Peterson Road nestled between the rushing waters of the Wichita River and the shores of Horseshoe Lake. The quiet countryside winery features a

tasting room and banquet suite complete with a balcony overlooking the vineyard. It is a family owned full production vineyard and winery that creates some of the most unique wines in the Wichita Falls area. They are continuously hosting events like stargazing nights, grape stomping parties, vineyard harvesting parties and many more. They also offer tours of the vineyards and wine production areas. Their operating hours are Thursdays 3-7, Fridays 2-9, Saturdays 12-9 and Sundays 1-7.

Whether you are looking for the convenience of downtown or the tranquility of the countryside, these 3 wineries are all desirable and available for people to bring in their passports and possibly win three great prizes.
